

Suriana maritima Bois matelot Family: Surianaceae

Sailor's Wood is a bushy shrub that looks like a "doormat" if exposed to strong winds but can grow up to 4 m high if sheltered.

It has many erect branches.

Its ash-green leaves give off an aroma like that of cedar when crushed.

Its yellow flowers are solitary and have 5 petals.

The fruits (drupes) have the property to resist a prolonged stay in sea water to allow their dispersion.
